<p><b>Tim Atkins – Care Quality Commission</b></p> 	<p>Tim Atkins has been Head of Strategy at CQC since October 2017. He is leading a number of areas of work in CQC, including developing the organisation’s approach to regulating innovative and technology-enabled care, understanding how CQC can encourage providers to improve, and CQC’s horizon scanning process. Before joining CQC, Tim was at the OECD, leading the work programme on long-term care; and previously worked at the Department of Health, most recently as Head of Social Care Finance.</p>
<p><b>David Bell - Stirling University</b></p> 	<p>David Bell was educated at the University of Aberdeen and the London School of Economics. He has been a Professor of Economics at the University of Stirling since 1990, having previously been employed at the Universities of St Andrews, Strathclyde, Warwick and Glasgow. He has specialised in labour and health economics as well as the economics of education, the economics of ageing and fiscal federalism.</p> <p>He has advised the UK and Scottish Governments and acted as adviser to parliamentary committees in the Scottish Parliament and the House of Lords. From 2007 to 2014 he was Budget Adviser to the Finance Committee of the Scottish Parliament. He has also given evidence to numerous committees in the UK and the Scottish Parliaments, and the Welsh and Northern Irish Assemblies.</p> <p>He helped establish the Scottish Graduate Programme in Economics and has supervised numerous PhD students as well as teaching at undergraduate and masters levels.</p> <p>He has been involved with many funded research projects. He is Principal Investigator on the HAGIS (Healthy Aging In Scotland) study. The pilot survey for HAGIS was funded by the Nuffield Foundation and the US National Institute on Aging. It is the first longitudinal study of older people in Scotland and part of the Gateway to Global Aging.</p> <p>He is currently the Royal Society of Edinburgh’s Vice-President for the Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences. He was awarded the CBE in 2018 for his services to economics and public policy.</p>
<p><b>John Bolton - JRFB Ltd</b></p>	<p>John is currently a Visiting Professor at The Institute of Public Care (Oxford Brookes University) and an independent consultant working in adult social care and the NHS. John is a former Director at the Audit Commission as well as a former Director of Social Services in Coventry and has completed</p>



three interim Director Assignments at Warwickshire, Westminster and Walsall. For the last two decades John has been interested in how the money works in adult care and he has written extensively on the topic (as well as spending a period of time as the Strategic Finance Director at the Department of Health responsible for social care) with a range of his publications appearing on the Institute of Public Care web site: <https://ipc.brookes.ac.uk/publications.htm>. He spends much of his time working directly with councils to assist them in delivering more cost effective approaches to adult care. John has been the “Efficiency Adviser” to the Local Government Association. John has worked extensively on the health and social care interface and has in recent years taken a particular interest in cost effective models to better manage (reduce) delayed transfers of care. His approach has recently been adopted by the Welsh Government to test with Health Boards and Local Authorities. John works across the United Kingdom in all four home countries as well as in the past undertaking work for the Icelandic, the Israeli and the Irish Governments. John was a key note speaker at the European Social Services Conference this year.

**Leanne Dew – Department for Health and Social Care**



Leanne is a Research Liaison Officer in the Science, Research and Evidence Directorate in the Department for Health and Social Care. As well as being Liaison Officer for ESHCRU II, Leanne has responsibility for social care research and co-leads on multimorbidity research. Leanne is a member of the Government Social Research (GSR) profession and the Government Analysis Function.

<p><b>David Evans – CHAIN</b></p> 	<p>David Evans began working in the NHS in 1985, initially training in finance, value for money auditing and commissioning, in Health Authorities in Surrey and across London. Working at Regional level David developed an interest in clinical effectiveness and when the NHS Research &amp; Development Programme launched in the early 1990s he moved into a role to create and improve linkages between the NHS and R&amp;D in North Thames (later London) Region, with an emphasis on engagement and dissemination of evidence and the implementation of evidence-based improvements. He developed his own understanding of evidence-based practice studying at Oxford, and in 1997 he established the CHAIN, a multi-professional virtual mutual-support network for clinicians, service managers, researchers and educators. Since 2003 directing CHAIN has been his main role, and in 2005 the network became semi-autonomous. The membership has subsequently grown more than 6-fold and CHAIN now has more than 16,000 members, of whom around 13,000 are based in the UK and 3,000 overseas. David now lives in Scotland with his wife and two daughters.</p>
<p><b>Joyce Fox - PPI contributor</b></p> 	<p>Joyce Fox has a background in the delivery and management of training and education, spanning secondary, further and higher education, industry and the third sector. She has experience, both personal and as a carer, of navigating the complexities of health and social care services and for the last seven years has used this experience to inform her work in a range of Patient and Public Involvement roles. These include working with the NIHR as a lay member on the NIHR Impact Board, INVOLVE Advisory Group and Research for Patient Benefit Yorkshire and North East, and as Patient Partner with the Centre for Epidemiology Versus Arthritis at the University of Manchester and the NHS Innovation Accelerator. She is keen to promote the voice of end-users and carers as an integral part of research and service delivery across the health and social care eco-system.</p>
<p><b>Hilary Graham - University of York</b></p> 	<p>Hilary Graham has a background in sociology and social policy. She has a track-record of research concerned with social inequalities in health, with a particular focus on health-related behaviours. Her current research is exploring the implications of climate change for people's health and everyday lives.</p> <p>Hilary has led a range of research programmes, including the ESRC Health Variations Programme (1996-2001), which investigated the links between social and health inequalities, and the Department of Health Public Health Research Consortium (2005-11). She has continued to be a collaborator in the Public Health Research Consortium (2011-19) and is a Co-Investigator in the new NIHR Public Health Policy Research Unit (2019-2024, led by LSHTM).</p>

<p><b>Ian Holmes - NHS Wakefield Clinical Commissioning Group</b></p> 	<p>Ian started his career in healthcare in 1998 as a government economist, providing economic advice in the Department of Health on a range of topics, including workforce (supply and contracts), primary care and finance. He moved from there to a range of policy and strategy roles in Department of Health and the NHS. Between 2012 and 2016 Ian worked at NHS England, firstly as Head of the Mandate, Partnerships and Accountability team, managing the relationship between NHS England and the DH, and secondly as Head of the Policy Unit, providing policy advice to NHSE leadership on a range of topics. Ian joined the West Yorkshire and Harrogate Health and Care Partnership as Director in August 2016. He leads the partnership 'core team', which works to provide the support and infrastructure to the leadership across West Yorkshire and Harrogate.</p>
<p><b>Debby Lennard - PPI contributor</b></p> 	<p>Debby Lennard retired in 2015 as a senior civil servant working in IT and Change Management. Debby's last role was as Head of IT Projects for the Home Office. Since retiring she has become involved in health and social care research. Debby is passionate about research and its role in finding new and better treatments and ways of working. <p><b>Owen O'Donnell - Erasmus University</b></p> 	<p>Owen O’Donnell is a Professor in the Schools of Economics and Health Policy &amp; Management at Erasmus University Rotterdam. He is a Research Fellow of the Tinbergen Institute and a Senior Researcher at the University of Lausanne. His research interests include health inequality, healthcare equity, disability insurance, medical expenditure risk, health insurance and risk perceptions. He is an Editor of the Journal of Health Economics and an Associate Editor of Health Economics.</p>
<p><b>Nick Price - PPI contributor</b></p> 	<p>Nick has worked in the social care and health sectors, in small community organisations, in large national voluntary organisations in Frontline, Senior Management and Board-level roles.</p> <p>He has a keen interest in how the health and social care sectors function and interrelate (and don’t) in delivering the services they are set up to and the extent to which the voices of patients/users are genuinely heard and acted upon.</p> <p>Nick also has substantial personal experience of using the NHS and of negotiating the health and social care systems as a carer.</p>
<p><b>Judith Smith - University of Birmingham</b></p> 	<p>Professor Judith Smith is Director of the Health Services Management Centre (HSMC) at the University of Birmingham. Her research focuses on the management of primary and integrated care, evaluation of new care models, and organisational governance. She is Director of the BRACE Rapid Evaluation Centre (2018-2023) funded by the National Institute of Health Research (NIHR), and Non-Executive Director of the Birmingham Women and Children’s Hospital NHS Foundation Trust. She was advisor and assessor to the Francis Inquiry into the events at Mid-Staffordshire NHS Foundation Trust, and Chair of the Royal Pharmaceutical Society’s Commission on New Models of Care in Pharmacy.</p>

**Jose M Valderas - University of Exeter**



Jose M Valderas is Professor of Health Services & Policy Research at the University of Exeter and a practising General Practitioner at St Leonard's Practice, Exeter, United Kingdom. He has conducted health services and policy research in Spain, the United States, Australia and, since 2007, in the United Kingdom (Manchester, Oxford, Exeter). His expertise is in the use of patient reports on their own health for decision making in health policy and clinical practice, and the evaluation and improvement of processes (quality and safety) and outcomes of Primary Health Care, with a particular interest in patients with multiple conditions. He has provided expert advice to the Organisation for Economic Co-operation & Development (OECD) on patient reported quality indicators, to the World Health Organization and Panamerican Health Organization on Primary Care, Non Communicable Diseases, and Patient Safety and to NHS England on financial incentives schemes for quality improvement in Primary Care. He has been elected by his peers to serve as President of the International Society for Quality of Life Research.
